I would like to make residents aware of the recent incidences of vandalism which we have experienced in the area of parkland in Owley Wood known as Bottom Pitch Meadow. At Easter several youths were involved in

damage to young trees and a dry hedge which divides the park from the main woods. Again, recently, a number of youths were in the area and actually started a fire which, given the dry conditions, if it had managed to get a real hold could have had a devastating effect on the whole of Owley Wood. Both of these incidents have been reported to the police who have been provided with photographs of some of the youths and the car in which two of them were driven away. Hopefully they will be found and prosecuted. Unpaid volunteers work extremely hard to maintain this area for the people of Weaverham and district and it is a shame that a small number of mindless vandals could ruin the area for everyone. Therefore I would urge any residents who witness any such acts in the future or have any knowledge of the perpetrators to call the police immediately.

CWAC Councillors

As the days grow longer and the weather continues to remain glorious, we are looking forward to the annual events within the villages and the opportunities for togetherness this Summer. Behind the scenes, volunteers are already hard at work, and we encourage everyone to get involved whether by lending a hand, donating prizes or simply turning up with a smile.

Thank you to everyone who took part in Weaverham's VE day commemorations, from the bunting in the streets to the shared moments of reflection and remembrance. Special thanks to those who helped organise events to honour those who served, and to remember the sacrifices made by so many.

Cheshire and Warrington have been confirmed as being on the priority programme for Devolution. Therefore, during March and April Government consulted on proposals for devolution for Cheshire and Warrington - We await the publication of the analysis and outcomes of the consultation from Government which will determine if Cheshire and Warrington has met the statutory tests for a Mayoral Combined Authority and remains on the Devolution Priority Programme. If it has, Mayoral elections are still planned for May 2026. Please note, devolution is not about merging councils or taking decisions away from councils. Cheshire West and Chester Council will still exist as is, retaining its current responsibilities and continuing to provide services for local people. It is hoped that the newly created Cheshire and Warrington (made up of representatives from the three councils and chaired by an elected Mayor) will increase the potential for much greater funding and increased collaboration between councils over issues like transport or housing, that require joined-up planning across council boundaries – Watch this space for further updates.

It's the time of year when hedges and grass cutting take up a lot of room in our email inboxes! Please report any grass cutting of verges and public spaces and CWAC owned hedges via the Report it App or webpage. If a hedge is within a private property, in the first instance please approach Weaverham Parish Council to contact them and ask them to act. If they do not do this within a reasonable timescale, then you can report it to CWAC via the Report It App. If the landowner does not act, CWAC have the authority to cut back and charge if there is a safety risk. This can take six months to action. Please be mindful that there may be all sorts of reasons why the works haven't taken place and CWAC will work with the landowner to help overcome any challenges. Unless for safety reasons, trees and hedges must not be cut back now until September due to nesting season. www.cheshirewestandchester.gov.uk/residents/contact-us/report-it

We continue to support the A49 Safe Walking Route and are pleased to have funded the cutting back of the vegetation which has resulted in a wider, safer footway.

Memorial Orchard

YOUNG, MIDDLE AGED OR RETIRED?

The Memorial Orchard was planted in memory of those who served in two World Wars and in more recent conflicts, to save the Wareham Russet apple tree from extinction and to grow it alongside other Cheshire heritage fruit trees. Our action group was formed in 2014, which marked the centenary of the start of the First World War. In 2015 the Woodland Trust offered us a lease on approximately an acre of land in Thorn Wood. The Cheshire heritage fruit trees which we have planted need pruning and caring for and we also need to weed around the trees. By only allowing the 'grass' to be cut once a year we have increased the number of wild flowers growing in the orchard and have planted native (i.e.wild) daffodils.

Why not join our happy band of volunteers and make new friends? Get the benefit of fresh air. gentle exercise satisfaction of knowing that you are preserving our heritage and environment whilst looking after a fitting tribute to the fallen and survivors of past conflicts. Our working parties normally meet on a weekday for a couple of hours when necessary. We realise that those who are not retired are not free mid-week so if we have enough volunteers, we could form another group to work at the weekend. We only meet two or three times a year and meetings are very short. It would be lovely to see you.

Weaverham Myths and Legends

Weaverham Well

Before the introduction of mains water supply, villagers collected clean water from Weaverham Well in, of course, Well Lane. The stream that fed the well is culverted now but in times of heavy rainfall it might be heard, near Well Lane's junction with Farm Road.

The legend goes that visitors to Weaverham, taken to drink the well water, would surely return in the future.

Captain Hatton

In "the Story of our Village" otherwise a remarkable local history book published by the local Women's Institute in 1952, Captain Hatton's story can be found.

In summary, Captain Hatton, a Weaverham resident, was hanged for piracy in the early 1800s. However, the resourceful Captain Hatton had a silver tube inserted in his throat which saved him from asphyxiation and his sentence was reduced after the unsuccessful hanging. After that episode the law was changed to "shall be hanged by the neck until dead" to avoid the possibility of condemned criminals cheating their sentence in future.

Disappointingly there is no legal record of this event and apparently this story is repeated many times around the UK with different names attached to it, so it is clearly a myth.

The secret passageway from Weaverham Church to Vale Royal Abbey

When King Henry VIII broke with Rome , Weaverham was well known as a place which clung on to the older forms of worship. This much is true.

But there was said to be an underground passageway from Weaverham to Vale Royal Abbey. The civil engineering prospects in the 1500s must make the story implausible but it is possible that well-worn footpaths, lined by thickets and overhanging trees may well have provided an opportunity for discreet travellers. Who knows?

Weaverham History Society visit to Cannon Hall, near Barnsley, Yorkshire on Thursday, 24 July with the option of visiting Cannon Hall Farm (of Channel 5 fame)



Cannon Hall Museum Park and Gardens is situated at Cawthorne, Barnsley and was the home of the Spencer-Stanhope family. It now houses collections of fine furniture, paintings, ceramics and glassware by the artist Evelyn De Morgan and her husband William De Morgan. There are also Victorian pleasure grounds, a Georgian walled garden, plus a shop, café and florists.

Why are we travelling all the way to Yorkshire?

The Rev Charles Spencer-Stanhope, who was born at Cannon Hall in 1795, was the characterful and forgetful vicar of St Mary's Church in Weaverham from 1833 to his death in 1874 aged 79. He even forgot and left his bride at the station when returning from their honeymoon! One of the beautiful stained glass windows in St Mary's Church is dedicated to him.

In 1871 the parish of Weaverham was divided and the Spencer-Stanhope family paid for a church to be built at Crowton where the troubled eldest son became the first vicar and he is now buried in the churchyard. So, a strong connection between Weaverham and Yorkshire.



Next door you can walk to Cannon Hall Farm which is famous as the venue for Springtime and Winter on the Farm and A Yorkshire Farm on Channel 5 hosted by the Nicholson brothers, Richard, David and Robert.

Visiting the farm is an additional and optional part to this trip and you will have to book and pay for this yourself on line beforehand. The cost is approximately £9. Details are on their website www.cannonhallfarm.co.uk.

Coach pick-up will be from the St Mary's Church car park with the coach leaving at 9 am - aiming to arrive at Cannon Hall by 11.00 am. You will then have some free time to have lunch before we are given a talk by the Curator of Cannon Hall in the ballroom at 1 pm. After the talk you will have plenty of time to explore the Hall, the current pre-Raphaelite exhibition, the gardens and visit the Nicholson farm. The coach will depart at 4.30 pm to arrive back in Weaverham at approximately 6.30 pm.

The cost will be £40 per person, which includes the admission donation to Cannon Hall and the cost of the coach and drivers' tips. Payment can be made by BACS sort code 09-01-29 account no 26685458. Open to all, you don't have to be a member of the Society to go on the trip.

The installation of the bird box with a camera has caused quite a stir.


It has been amazing to watch the blue tits build their nest and lay their eggs. We can't wait for the eggs to hatch!
